Swede Tony Gustavsson has enjoyed a long and successful 22-year coaching career in both women's and men's football. Gustavsson has led a collection of clubs in his homeland before playing a significant role in two title-winning tenures with the United States Women's National Team.

Gustavsson is a two-time FIFA Women's World Cup winner, having been a part of Jill Ellis' coaching staff for the USA at Canada 2015 and France 2019, and has an Olympic Gold Medal to his name, having been an Assistant to compatriot Pia Sundhage for the USWNT at the London Olympics in 2012.

During his tenure with the CommBank Matildas, Gustavsson has led the team to a best ever result at the Olympic Games or FIFA Women's World Cup where the team finished fourth.

Mackenzie Arnold has been named in her third FIFA Women’s World Cup squad, looking to make her tournament debut on home soil. The shot-stopper has made five appearances for the Matildas in 2023, keeping a clean sheet in three of the fixtures.

A breakout season with West Ham United in the WSL saw Arnold receive the Player’s Player Award, as voted by her club teammates. Her top performance for club saw her play in all three games at the 2023 edition of the Cup of Nations, helping Australia lift the trophy once again and being named Player of the Tournament.

The keeper’s last appearance for Gustavsson’s side was during Australia’s 2-0 win over England, with Arnold keeping the reigning UEFA Women’s Euro Champions goalless and helping the Matildas break their 30-match unbeaten run.

Arnold made her debut for Australia back in 2012 at the age of 18, keeping a clean sheet in a 7-0 victory over Chinese Taipei. Since that game over a decade ago, Mackenzie has made 34 appearances for Australia at the senior level.

Ellie Carpenter has been named in her second FIFA Women’s World Cup squad, aiming to build on her four appearances at the 2019 edition of the tournament.

After a standout performance at the 2019 FIFA Women’s World Cup and a strong inaugural season abroad with Portland Thorns, the defender made the move to the most successful side in European football, signing with Olympique Lyonnais in France.

The two-time UEFA Women’s Champions League winner suffered a heart-breaking injury during Lyon’s UWCL Final win over FC Barcelona, rupturing her anterior cruciate ligament.

A home FIFA Women’s World Cup just within reach, Carpenter went through eight months of rehab before making her long-awaited return for Lyon in February 2023, before picking up right where she left off and making her return for Australia in the April international window.

Since making her debut over a decade ago, the defender has amassed 100 appearances for Australia, becoming just the 13th player to reach the milestone.

The defender currently plays with Arsenal in the Women’s Super League, helping the Gunners to the Continental Cup title this season, her first piece of silverware since making the move to the North London-based club.

Alex Chidiac has been named in her first FIFA Women’s World Cup squad. After just missing selection for the 2019 edition of the tournament, Chidiac will be looking to make her debut in the major tournament on home soil.

Chidiac’s youth football started with Croydon Kings, where she played on an all boys team before joining Football South Australia’s National Training Centre program and starring in the state’s Premier League competition.

Time spent with Adelaide United and Melbourne City at a young age impressed overseas scouts, with the midfielder making the move to Spanish side Atletico Madrid, becoming the first Australian to play in Liga F.

A stellar season with Melbourne Victory in the A-League saw Chidiac receive her first call-up to the national team since 2019, playing in Australia’s two-game series against New Zealand and describing the moment as almost a second debut.

Chidiac now calls Louisville home, signing with Racing in the NWSL after completing a loan stint back at Melbourne Victory, with her impressive 6 goals in 13 appearances in 2022-23 securing the League’s highest honour, the prestigious Julie Dolan Medal for her memorable season.

Since making her debut for Australia back in 2021, the midfielder has played against some of the top countries in the world, holding her own against the likes of Sweden, the USA and England, earning praise for her composure on the ball and ability to grow into the game.

After making her debut in the A-League Women’s with Melbourne Victory when she was only 15 years old, the midfielder went on to win back-to-back Championships after returning to the club following a brief stint at Western Sydney Wanderers.

The young midfielder then made the dream move to Sweden, signing with Hammarby and quickly becoming a fan favourite at the Stockholm-based side, helping them claim the Swedish Cup last month, the club’s first trophy in 28 years.

Caitlin Foord has been named in her fourth FIFA Women's World Cup squad, looking to add to her appearances at the major tournament.

This will be the forward's fourth FIFA Women's World Cup, after bursting onto the scene at the 2011 edition of the tournament and picking up the Best Young Player of the Tournament award. Foord scored her first goal at a FIFA Women's World Cup at the 2019 edition of the tournament, inspiring Australia's comeback in their 3-2 win over Brazil.

Since that game in France, Foord has gone on to star in the Women's Super League with Arsenal, most recently helping the Gunners claim the Continental Cup. Her fine club form has translated into her international performance, scoring back-to-back braces against Denmark and Sweden.

Foord will be looking towards Australia's opening game of the tournament against the Republic of Ireland, coming up against Arsenal teammate Katie McCabe and aiming to play in front of a capacity crowd in her hometown.

Mary Fowler has been named in her second FIFA Women’s World Cup squad, looking to make her debut at the tournament after not appearing in the 2019 edition in France.

Fowler was the youngest member of the 2019 squad, named in the squad at just 16 after shining for the youth national team.

The Cairns-born forward will be playing in her fourth major tournament, finding the back of the net in the last two tournaments she played in, during the 2022 AFC Women’s Asian Cup and scoring a goal against Great Britain at the 2020 Tokyo Olympic Games.

Fowler’s club career saw her sign her first overseas contract with Montpellier HSC, spending two seasons in France before inking a four-year contract with Manchester City in the Women’s Super League.

Australia’s opening game of the tournament will see them face the Republic of Ireland, with Fowler scoring her first-ever senior brace in Australia’s last meeting with the side.

Her club career has seen her spend most of her time with hometown club Brisbane Roar, with stints in the USA with Utah Royals and Avaldsnes in Norway in between. Gorry has now signed with Vittsjö GIK in Sweden, setting up a home away from home in Sweden.

Gorry has formed a formidable partnership with Cooney-Cross in the Matildas’ midfield, with both playing alongside one another in all five of Australia’s matches in 2023.

Charlotte Grant has been named in her first FIFA Women's World Cup squad, looking to make her debut in the tournament on home soil.

The young defender's footballing journey began with Cumberland United Women's Football Club as a junior, where her talent was quickly identified, and she was invited into Football South Australia's National Training Centre Program. Grant then signed with hometown club, Adelaide United, at just 17 years old, making her debut for the Reds that same year.

Grant made her maiden appearance at the senior level in Australia's game against the Republic of Ireland in September 2021 and then went on to make her starting debut at the 2022 AFC Women's Asian Cup.

Injuries to experienced defenders saw Grant find a place in the Starting XI against some of the biggest teams in the world, holding her own against the likes of Sweden, Spain and England, even managing to score her first goal and being named Player of the Match in Australia's 2-0 win over the Lionesses.

1991 FIFA Women’s World Cup (China)

Australia failed to qualify through the three-team Oceania qualifiers (Australia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea) for the first FIFA Women’s World Cup, the qualifying tournament held in May 1991 in Sydney. Australia and New Zealand swapped 1-0 results in the round-robin series, meaning that comparative results against Papua New Guinea would determine first place and the World Cup qualifying team. Group winners New Zealand defeated PNG by a combined 27 goals (16-0, 11-0), while Australia’s goal difference was just 20 (12-0, 8-0), with the PNG side improving through to its last game of the tournament, against Australia.
